Foresight, Hard Work and Tenaciousness Ensure Our Future Executive Report by Marsha Solnicki



The following is an excerpt from the 'State of the Order' address given by UJPO President Marsha Solnicki at our recent Annual General Meeting.

This year marks the 85th anniversary of Camp Naivelt, the 65th anniversary of United Jewish People's Order – Canada and the 50th anniversary of the Winchevsky Centre. I was born into this organization. My dad, **Izzie Fine** and to a lesser extent my mom, **Helen Fine**, were long-time members and activists. My memory bank goes back to the mid-1950s, and I share these memories with some other second and third (or more) generations of UJPO-ers whose memories reach still farther back. I think at times there has been too much dwelling in the past, not focusing on how the world and we have changed, and how to prepare for the future. But we must give our founders great credit for our organization still being here.

We are all here today because of the foresight and very hard work of our founding members and others for two specific things. First of all, the founding of our children's summer camp, **Camp Kinderland** and later, the family version of **Camp Naivelt**, together on the beautiful piece of land we have near Brampton. By managing to buy this land – against great odds, both financial and discriminatory – we still have today a unique little paradise which we strive to protect, and is for this organization, a vibrant precious jewel to preserve. Heritage designation by the City of

Brampton is now a possibility and perhaps, at some time in the future, it may become a national cultural site.

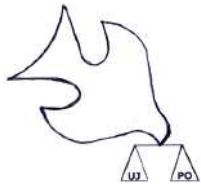
The other important event to which we owe some of our existence today is the purchase of the **Winchevsky Centre building**. Yes, the UJPO had its share of business-like 'movers and shakers', who saw to it that a piece of land was bought and a building erected. Think about it! This was no small feat. Building Lasting Relationships While Building Lasting Change

Last fall, our family proudly became members of the United Jewish People's Order. While we had been peripherally aware of The Winchevsky Centre, occasionally attending the Third Seyder and other events, it wasn't until the birth of our daughter Levia that we began to actively seek out a community in which to raise her – not an easy task in a society that privileges conservative, homogeneous and oppressive ideas of what family means.

We are a queer family. We are a socialist family. We believe that freedom and justice matter above all else, and we work every day in our jobs and in our lives to this end. Our daughter is the child of a first generation Russian Jew and a runaway from small town Ontario Irish Catholics. We will raise her to love and understand all aspects of her queer, socialist, Jewish and Irish family. And in the end, we will encourage her to be the best she can be and who she wants to be. Just as we encourage each other to do the same.

When we enrolled Levia in **Kinder Kapers**, an interactive toddler program, I remember a co-worker remarking, "I didn't know she was half-Jewish". The comment threw me off, as I had never thought of her as being half of anything. She is wholly herself, and that includes being wholly Jewish. Levia loves Kinder Kapers, and she knows that when we pull up in the car that she will be warmly received by teacher **Lisa Roy** and the other families who attend. She will sing and dance and create and celebrate her Jewishness. I feel such a deep sense of relief that this community exists for her. That as she grows and becomes who she wants to be, that she will have this resource, this family, to help guide her.

When we attended the **Sukkes** celebration last fall, we were lucky enough to get a tour of **Camp Naivelt**. We immediately

fell in love, and went home fantasizing about how wonderful it would be if we could be a part of this magical place. We are excited that we will be renting a cottage at Camp this coming summer.

In time, we look forward to meeting all of the people who make up the UJPO community. And more importantly, we hope to build lasting relationships while working to build lasting change.

Remembering Larry Usiskin February 24, 1920 – January 15, 2010

Larry Usiskin, long-time member of the UJPO in **Winnipeg**, passed away in January of this year. To know Larry was to experience his kindness and his generosity in his quiet way.

Larry's father, David Usiskin, began his life in Canada as a Jewish homesteader in Edenbridge, Saskatchewan. Larry's mother, Esther Travis, however, was a city girl – and so they moved to Winnipeg for Larry's birth. The Usiskins became chicken farmers in Fort Garry, the south part of Winnipeg.

There were three children in the family: Larry, his younger brother Sid and Marcia, who was 16 years younger than Larry. Times were difficult, as it was the Depression years and the family needed Larry's wages. Despite his considerable academic abilities, he went to work at the age of 16, just after he finished high school. Marcia, Larry's sister, remembers that thanks to Larry, the family was able to afford such luxuries as a record player. One of his first jobs was as a delivery boy

on a bicycle for Warkov-Safeer Leather. He worked there for 55 years until his retirement, working his way up and eventually owning the business.

Larry and his family were life-long members of the Freiheit Temple, and original members of the UJPO in Winnipeg. Larry became active in the UJPO Youth Group in the 1940s where he met and married **Roz Wolodarsky**. They were married for 60 years. Larry and Roz were a very good team. Ideologically, they both remained strong supporters and activists in the UJPO. Many of us know Roz and how much she has done for the Jewish community and the UJPO in Winnipeg as its President and nationally as a Vice President, but a relative commented that their partnership was indeed an equal one. Roz once said of Larry that, "he lets me make all the decisions he agrees with!"

The family grew to include sons Michael, Arnold and Len, their wives Jean, Robyn and Priscilla, and grandchildren Jana, Mika, Josh, Beth, Aaron and Jacqui. The extended Usiskin and Wolodarsky clan are a large, loving family, requiring the renting of a big hall for get-togethers as no single house can fit them all.

Larry read voraciously about everything. He was gentle, non-judgmental, offering advice when asked and never calling attention to himself. Through example in word and deed, he created a legacy of support and caring for his immediate and extended family and community. After his passing, many of his friends donated money to **Outlook Magazine** as a tribute to Larry – a gesture very much in line with his generosity and principled politics.

Feeling Accepted and Comfortable as Secular Jews

The initial motivation for myself, my husband and my son to start coming to the Shule and the Winchevsky Centre many years ago was to celebrate the holidays. To celebrate in the way we felt accepted and comfortable as **Secular Jews**.

In thinking back, we started with Chanukah, the holiday we were the most familiar with. Celebrating Chanukah represented having fun playing *dreydel*, eating yummy *latkes*, receiving presents and singing songs. As our son grew older, the significance of the holiday included getting to know the story of the Maccabees and their fight for freedom.

My mother always joined us on these occasions, as she was the reason we started to come to the Winchevsky – she was active in a variety of groups and committees associated with the Winchevsky/UJPO community, and I had grown up with the same left-wing, humanistic philosophy.

As we grew to feel that the Winchevsky Centre was our place to celebrate being Jewish, we began coming to other holiday celebrations and our son attended Shule classes every Sunday morning. His

favourite holiday next to Chanukah was Purim. Purim was another opportunity to have fun: to dress up, play games, be joyous, eat and make lots of noise. He always anticipated the fun he would have playing games and winning prizes at the Winchevsky's annual Purim Carnival. This past Saturday February 27th, our son helped supervise the console game booth at the **Family Purim Carnival**.

My family felt that the day was planned with activities for all age groups. It started with a short Purim play performed by The Winchevsky Wits, "*Shushan Shenanigans*", a play was traditional in content for the children, with wit and humour for the adults. We were then entertained with the interactive mummies play "*Rise Up Jock!*" performed by **Clay & Paper Theatre**, a costume parade led by an enormous Clay & Paper puppet, a variety of carnival games and activities and, of course, food.

This is our son's last year attending Shule, as he, along with two other classmates, are preparing for their **B'nai Mitzvah Ceremony** in June. As this chapter in our lives draws to a close, I realize that my family will have to find new ways to continue participating in a community in which we have always felt welcome!
